TIPS TO LIGHTEN YOUR LOAD AND PAY LESS

SAVE TIME AND MONEY! THE MORE YOU KNOW BEFORE YOU GET THERE, THE LESS MONEY YOU'LL HAVE TO PAY.

- Know which items are accepted at Metro's transfer stations for recycling at no charge. (hyperlink to the web page http://www. oregonmetro.gov/index.cfm/go/ by.web/id=29040
- Sort and separate common recyclables - newspaper, cardboard, magazines, plastic bottles, tubs and nursery pots, scrap metal - and earn a rebate on disposal.
- 3. Put recyclables on the top or at one end of your load.
- Some items are not accepted for recycling, such as plate or tempered glass, barbed wire and riding lawn mowers.
- Some items are not accepted for disposal or recycling, such as vehicles, loads of liquids, petroleum contaminated soil and radioactive materials.
- Make it safe put dangerous materials in a cardboard box, like pool and spa chemicals, sharps, asbestos and hazardous waste.
- 7. Put lighter-weight items at the bottom of the load.
- 8. Don't overload. Keep it safe for yourself and others on the road!

- Secure your load to cut down on 9. litter and disposal fees. Cover it with a tarp and use rope, straps or bungee cords to tie it down.
- 10. Know your load. Be prepared to describe the contents to the attendant.
