

Not recyclable at home or work


Hazardous


Boxes for frozen and refrigerated food






Plastic cups, lids and straws

Glass

Glass bottles and jars (green, clear and brown) No broken glass, no caps, put glass items in a separate bin




Metal

Aluminum, tin and steel cans, empty dry metal paint cans, empty aerosol cans, aluminum foil, scrap metal (shorter than 30 inches and less than 30 lbs)



Plastic

Round food containers (6 oz. or larger), jugs, jars and bottles (6 oz. or larger), plant pots (4-inch diameter or larger), buckets (5 gallons or smaller) No lids



Paper

Newspapers, egg cartons, magazines, catalogs, flattened cardboard boxes, scrap paper, cartons (milk, juice, soup)
