Community-led programs grants

What are grants for?

Activities or programs that facilitate connection to nature for BIPOC communities.

What can they pay for?

Funds may cover staff time, leadership development, materials and supplies, IT services and hardware, participant stipends, transportation, food and other costs related to connecting BIPOC communities with nature.



What groups and activities qualify?

Groups

- Led by and for BIPOC communities
- Have accepted legal entity status to receive funds, cannot be political committees, campaigns or lobbying groups
- Mission or business purpose aligns with the programmatic initiatives of the Community Partnerships program

Activities

- Must contribute to the Parks and Natural Areas Levy goal of increasing opportunities for communities of color to experience nature.
- Benefit Metro area residents
- Held between June 1, 2024 September 30, 2025

What are some examples of what funds can pay for?

- Advancing the group's ability to connect communities of color with nature, including staff time, program outreach costs, and insurance for events.
- Training, professional and leadership development of staff or community members related to increasing capacity to connect communities of color with nature
- Materials and supplies, such as gardening equipment, backpacking gear, food, etc.
- IT services, software, and hardware for activities such as online curriculum development, administration, and participation, nature education guides, or information sharing: multimedia support, network connections, or improved broadband.
- Transportation costs for community members, including bus passes, gas cards and rideshare credits.
- Stipends and incentives for program participants
- Expansion or establishment of online programming that connects communities of color with nature.
- Expansion or establishment of in-person programming to connect people of color with nature
- Other activities that build capacity to connect communities of color with nature.

What are some examples of possible, allowed activities?

- Leadership development training for staff or community members that supports their capacity to offer programming that facilitates BIPOC connection with nature.
- Facilitation of an herbal medicine-making workshop for BIPOC communities in a park or natural area
- Creation of recommendations or best practices for Metro to consider when connecting BIPOC communities with nature or more collaborative programming with Metro staff and/or Metro's parks and natural areas.
- Acquisition of equipment to facilitate connecting communities with nature.
- Hiring a graphic designer to create a nature education field guide or other materials to facilitate BIPOC communities' connection with nature

Grant selection process

How much funding is available?

- Up to \$5,000 available per grant
- \$195,000 total available

What is the process to receive funds?

- 1. You fill out a grant request
- 2. Community and staff committee reviews and makes recommendations
- 3. The department director makes final decision.
