PARKS AND NATURE DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

Blue Lake Regional Park Watercraft Access

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10.03 - 1000 Purpose

The purpose of these rules is to manage watercraft access to and from Blue Lake through Blue Lake Regional Park.

10.03 - 1005 Definitions

- 1. "Non-motorized watercraft" is defined as a non-motorized device capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water. Exemptions include inner tubes, and beach and water toys.
- "Motorized watercraft" is defined as any device capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water that is propelled in-whole or in-part by machinery, including being temporarily equipped with detachable motors. These include gasoline and electric motors.
- 3. "Watercraft" includes non-motorized and motorized watercraft.

10.03 – 1010 Legal Authority

These rules are issued under authority of Metro Code. These rules are in addition to all other requirements and provisions in Metro Code Title X.

10.03 – 1015 Applicability of Rules

These rules apply to Blue Lake Regional Park.

10.03 – 1020 Watercraft Type, Size, and Time Restrictions

Access to and from Blue Lake through Blue Lake Regional Park is permitted as follows:

 <u>Non-motorized watercraft</u>. Non-motorized watercraft, including sailboats less than seventeen (17) feet in length, paddleboards, kayaks, and canoes, may be launched and retrieved from designated areas in the park year-round.

- <u>Motorized watercraft</u>. Motorized watercraft, less than fourteen (14) feet in length AND 3.0 horsepower in motor capability, may be launched and retrieved from the boat ramp from October 1 to April 30 of the next calendar year.
- 3. Launching and retrieving watercraft is only permitted when Blue Lake Regional Park is open to the public.
- 4. Access to launch and retrieve watercraft may be restricted due to special events, maintenance activities near or in the lake, or park closure.
- 5. Watercraft launched from Blue Lake Regional Park must be off the lake one (1) hour before the park closes.

10.03 – 1025 Launching Restrictions

- 1. Launching and retrieving watercraft is only permitted from designated locations.
- 2. Launching and retrieving watercrafts is prohibited from the fishing pier and in the swim beach area.
- 3. Mooring watercraft on the fishing pier is prohibited.
- 4. Access to the boat ramp by vehicle is only permitted between October 1 and April 30 of the next calendar year or by Special Use Permit.
- 5. Prior to accessing the boat ramp with a vehicle to launch or retrieve watercraft, staff at the park office must be notified and permission obtained.

10.03 – 1030 Boat Livery Business

Boat livery businesses are prohibited to operate at Blue Lake Regional Park.

10.03 - 1035 Variances

If seeking permission to launch or retrieve boats outside the permissions of these rules a Special Use Permit must be obtained. Visit *oregonmetro.gov/specialuse* to review Special Use Permit process, rules, and apply.

10.03 – 1040 State Rules

- 1. All Oregon state rules and regulations are in effect on Blue Lake and must be followed.
- 2. All watercraft must have:
 - a. a USGS approved personal flotation device/life vest for each person in the watercraft; and
 - b. a sound signaling appliance or device onboard, such as a whistle.
- 3. Children age twelve (12) and under must wear a personal flotation device/life vest at all times.
- 4. To help prevent the spread of invasive species in Oregon waterways:
 - a. CLEAN all aquatic plants, animals, and mud from your vehicle, boat, motor, or trailer and discard in the trash.
 - b. RINSE, scrub, or pressure wash, as appropriate, but away from storm drains, ditches, or waterways.
 - c. DRAIN live wells, bilge, and all internal compartments.
 - d. DRY your boat between uses, if possible. Leave compartments open and sponge out standing water.
 - e. SCRUB or pressure-wash life jackets, waders, boots, landing nets, and other gear that contacted the water.
 - f. INSPECT everything for signs of aquatic invasive species before launching and before leaving.
