Recreational Immunity

- Protects landowners who open their land to the public free of charge
- New protections established this year sunset in 2026.
- We're still getting reports of trail closures and development stoppages
- Legislative workgroup hosted by Senator Prozanski
- Anticipating bill removing sunset clause.

What's happening in 2025?

Our transportation system is running out of money. Our legislature is trying to fix it.

They'll need to consider:

- Declining gas tax revenue
- Maintenance backlog
- Historic increase in traffic deaths & injuries
- Transportation carbon emissions rising
- ²/₃ majority req'd for revenue package



A win looks like:

Passing a revenue package

• get Oregon on track towards reliable funding for the future

Raising funds in a fair and sustainable way

• design progressive revenue tools with climate and equity in mind

Investing in our priorities:

• safe networks for walking, biking, and rolling, <u>including funding for trails</u>, public transit and paratransit, transportation electrification, and reducing the need to drive

Holding our institutions accountable

• Strengthen oversight for ODOT and accountability mechanisms for major transportation projects to stay on track with our safety and climate goals beyond 2025

Trails in a Transportation Measure

- Trails are the backbone of active transportation networks
- Trails create <u>safe</u> places for people of all ages and abilities to walk and bike
- Trails help communities meet VMT reduction and climate goalssupport local tourism economies
- Trails increase access to nature and health and wellness

What we need:

- Policy language to include walking and biking infrastructure in major capital project corridors to leverage more federal funding
- \$85-\$100 million/biennium for Oregon Community Paths: Fill the \$60 million biennial funding gap.




























Vision

Project Considerations

- **Center relationships:** Collaborative rather than transactional approach
- Promote transparency: Mindfulness of community lens-accountability, transparency, trust, relationship building.
- Create value for external partners/residents: avoid repetitive engagements/community/CBO overload.
- Minimize negative impact and burden to residents: Ensure community-focused value.
- **Diverse representation:** Consider the everyday experiences and priorities of our residents.
- Think from the resident's perspective: Coordinate/leverage existing related resources.

Timeline

PHASE 1







