Environmental Racism

Racismo ambiental

Definition:

The subjection of communities of color to live in environmentally hazardous, harmful or toxic conditions.

Results from the combination of racist social, economic, and governmental practices.

Significado:

El sometimiento de personas de color a vivir en condiciones ambientalmente peligrosas, nocivas o tóxicas.

Justicia ambiental

Definition:

The **fair treatment** and **meaningful involvement** of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the development, implementation and enforcement of laws, regulations and policies.

Significado:

El **trato justo** y la **participación significativa** de todas las personas independiente de la raza, color, origen nacional o ingresos con respecto al desarrollo, implementación y aplicación de las leyes, reglamentos y políticas ambientales.
